Raise Awareness

To raise awareness about the needs and challenges of children in care, the need for more foster carers and adopters from diverse backgrounds and the need to understand and address negative stereotypes, stigmas and barriers at all levels. 2.



Support Recruitment

To raise the profile of fostering and adoption in communities, providing education, training and support for potential foster carers and adopters. To work in partnership with local authorities and fostering and adoption agencies to support the recruitment of foster carers and adopters from diverse backgrounds.

Promote Identity

To enable and support children and young people in care and care leavers to develop a positive sense of identity and belonging. To work with professionals to support foster carers, adopters and the wider community through advice, educational resources, training and peer-led support networks.

Influence Policy

To work with key stakeholders within government and the care sector to promote good practice in order to influence the development of child centred policies and initiatives that would ensure better outcomes for children and young people in care, care leavers and foster carer and adopters.

Research and Advocacy

We take an informed-approach incorporating data insights, forming consultations, reviews and recommendations to help understand, engage and perform effectively. We seek to identify and address barriers to engagement and representation, facilitating better access and outcomes for minoritised communities in the social care sector.

In 2017, with the support of the Better Community Business Network, we launched the much acclaimed Muslim Fostering Project after recognising the historical shortfall of Muslim foster carers - a situation made worse over the last few years by the high number of UASC coming into care from Muslim countries.

The research aims:

- To identify the number of Muslim children being fostered at any one time
- To build a picture of the number of Muslim children being placed with non-Muslim foster carers and the reasons for this decision


This research will provide a comprehensive baseline for:

- Supporting the recruitment and retention of Muslim foster carers
- Improving outcomes for looked after Muslim children

There are approximately 5,000 Muslim-heritage children in the care sector according to the most recent research.

This includes unaccompanied asylum seeking children, a staggering 75-95% of whom it is estimated come from a Muslim background, and who have faced unimaginable trauma. For the care system to ensure these children don't face the added disadvantages inevitable from a system which doesn't recognise or understand their faith and cultural heritage, we need to advocate for change.

We are speaking to the care sector and the Muslim community to drive forward these recommendations, and we are calling for greater joined-up working, to Change a Life


Barriers Facing Potential Muslim Foster Carers

We take an informed-approach incorporating data insights, forming consultations, reviews and recommendations to help understand, engage and perform effectively.

We seek to identify and address barriers to engagement and representation, facilitating better access and outcomes for minoritised communities in the social care sector.

Some of the barriers identified include:

- Misunderstanding and mistrust of the role of public agencies
- Eurocentric approach and framework of practice
- Tokenism and lack of genuine engagement or participation with communities
- Lack of faith and cultural competence across services
- Poor recruitment practice
- Economic conditions and the need for a spare room when considering fostering



Report Recommendations

- Actively seek truly transformative anti-racism, cultural competency and faith-sensitive training from the ground up
- Provide better faith-sensitive support for carers of Muslim-heritage children in care
- Work with Muslim organisations and communities to create regular reflective practice groups for senior, policy making members of the sector to instigate, support and incorporate these measures strategically throughout the sector
- Ofsted to include mandatory recording of child's religion/ belief (protective characteristics, Equality Act 2010.)
- Understanding children's identity and heritage should be at the core of all fostering services
- Faith and cultural literacy across all content and resources
- Adequate training, development and support for professionals
- Community engagement and outreach through Foster Friday campaign and Ramadan & Eid Gift Box for Muslim children in care
- Exploring UASC specialist support
- Increaising reprentation and engagement;
 building community partnerships; codesigning content and campaigns, informed by lived experience and minoritised communities
- Wider dissemination of the Guide for Foster Carers Caring for Muslim Children

Education

Guide, Gift Box and Events

Our tailored guide for foster carers who look after Muslim children is an informative and practical publication that demystifies basic Islamic beliefs.

In addition to supporting foster carers, so they can better understand the needs of Muslim children in their care, it also supports the work of councils. The British Association of Adoption and Fostering (BAAF) has endorsed this publication, acknowledging its value and importance.

The Ramadhan gift box was introduced as a way to connect with non-Muslim carers who are looking after Muslim children. It provides practical information about Ramadhan and fasting, and serves as a reminder that the Muslim community appreciates and supports the work of non-Muslim carers.

Youth Initiatives & Partnership

We all have a duty of care in supporting vulnerable children, providing a safe and positive environment for young people to thrive.

At MFG we execute an ethos of understanding, learning and appreciation for other cultures, where religion or faith and heritage is upheld in the pursuit to nurture identity, wellbeing and purpose within our youth.

We take a multi-agency approach to supporting and advocating for Muslim heritage children in care. We offer a range of services that seek to improve and enhance the culture and practices around supporting children and young people from minoritised communities.

We are open to building partnerships and furthering youth services and community activities to engage young people, providing a sense of community, belonging and empowerment. We seek to broaden their horizon, scope and potential, opening new opportunities and building resilience. We seek partnership opportunities in developing and facilitating youth focussed initiatives, workshops, educational resources and activities, mentorship and community projects.

Barnados - Case Study

See Hear & Respond initiative aimed to work alongside 75 unique delivery partners, who have best reach and knowledge of the families and the issues they face.



The focus was to find the most vulnerable children and young people, not receiving support from statutory organisations and those at risk and/or experiencing adverse impact to their health and wellbeing. The initiative focused on supporting and safeguarding these children, preventing additional harm and ensuring their needs don't escalate to statutory interventions using three different strands of support.

My Foster Family and Bradford Foundation Trust came together to bid for the opportunity to get involved in this initiative.

Training & Development

Over the past seven years, we have provided a number of effective interventions, helping partners improve dialogue with, and recruitment from, the Muslim community.

We offer training to social care professionals, foster carers and adopters to advance their understanding, professionalism and confidence with minoritised communities. Training ranges from entry level understanding of Muslim heritage children in care to processes around fostering and adoption (recruitment, assessment and preparing for panel), to faith and culture sensitive training on identity and wellbeing. We offer practical guidance and support, facilitate partnership opportunities and specialist training to improve service outcomes.

Our professional trainers and instructors can deliver training programmes designed specifically for your organisation. Building upon a faith equity narrative within Equality, Diversity and Inclusivity frameworks, facilitating understanding and outreach with Muslim communities.



Cultural Competency in UASC

We provide a specialist workshop that explores the cultural identity and norms of children from the Middle East and Africa.

This is an essential workshop for social care professionals who are eager to better understand how they can meet the needs of unaccompanied minors from Middle Eastern or African backgrounds. Exploring religious and cultural norms and nuances will provide a critical insight into how we can understand the needs of these children – and a better understanding of needs will deliver better placements.

This is a great opportunity for new professionals, those managing unaccompanied minors, and veterans who would benefit from a fresh perspective.
